SIGMA XI NATIONAL LECTURER

Role of Engineers in Managing Risks From Natural Hazards

> Professor Robert B. Gilbert University of Texas, Austin

Tuesday, October 13, 2009 8:00 p.m., Alliant Energy-Lee Liu Auditorium Howe Hall (please note day and location)

Managing risks from natural hazards has taken on greater significance as the world becomes more interconnected and interrelated. Local disasters can now impact everyone, such as the high prices of oil in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. Also, the available resources to manage risk in the world as a whole are severely limited. Engineers are essential in providing civilization with technically effective solutions that balance costs, benefits and risks. This talk will address the important role of engineers in managing risks from natural hazards. Topics will include establishing goals, mitigating consequences, considering system effects, including physical factors in statistical models, avoiding both too much and too little conservatism, maximizing the value of information, and communicating effectively to decision makers and the public. Applications from around the world, ranging from offshore facilities to coastal flood control systems, will be used to illustrate and demonstrate the main ideas.

LOCAL HONOR LECTURER

Cooking, Fishing and Jogging through Phase Space: A Practical Guide to Discovering (and Understanding) New Materials

Professor Paul C. Canfield Department of Physics & Astronomy, ISU

Dr. Paul C. Canfield, Distinguished Professor in Liberal Arts and Sciences and the holder of the Robert Allen Wright Chair in Physics, has spent over a score of years in condensed matter physics, earning an international reputation for discovering and developing new materials. His work combines physics, chemistry, and metallurgy and is specifically focused on the properties of conducting and magnetic materials. In this lecture Dr. Canfield will outline the basic philosophy and techniques needed to search for novel materials. These include a combination of intuition, experience, compulsive optimism and a desire to share discovery. The lecture will be general and include side comments, mildly slanderous asides and references to philosophers living and dead.

- March 22, 2010. Deadline for receipt of acceptances from nominees for membership or promotion.
- April 12, 2010. Deadline for receipt of ballots for election of committee members.

April 29, 2010 (Thursday). The Annual Initiation Banquet will be held in the Scheman Building. At this event, the initiates (who are the Chapter's guests at the Banquet) are installed as members of Sigma Xi; Undergraduate Research Scholars are recognized and awarded the Lester Earls prize; the Zaffarano Prize for Graduate Student Research is awarded; the Karas Dissertation Award is announced; and the new President is installed. The evening begins with a social hour at 5:30, followed by dinner and the necessary initiation formalities. The evening will conclude with an address by the retiring President, Steven Kawaler, at 8:00 p.m., Moving Upstairs – One Astronomer's View of Why We Must Do Astronomy from Space.

GENERAL COMMENTS

We need to have you begin to think about those graduate students and colleagues whom you would wish to nominate for either Associate or Full Membership in Sigma Xi, or for Promotion from Associate To Full Membership. We also encourage you to consider those outstanding undergraduates who have had a research experience and whom you would wish to honor by nomination as Undergraduate Research Scholars. Generally, these Scholars would be initiated as Associate Members; however, an especially research-productive undergraduate might well qualify for Full Membership. General requirements for nomination as an Undergraduate Research Scholar are a good GPA (3.50 or better) and contribution to an original research investigation which has led to a written report, a presentation at an appropriate meeting and/or (preferably) a publication. Details will be given in the *Guidelines for Nomination* which you will receive together with a nomination form in the Winter, 2010 Newsletter. Note also, that recognition as an Undergraduate Research Scholar carries with it not only a certificate but also a monetary award, the Lester Earls Award, made possible by a generous contribution to the ISU Chapter by Professor Emeritus Lester Earls. We do publicize this honor to undergraduates, so do not be surprised by questions you may be asked.

Each of us needs to contribute the small amount of time necessary to recognize deserving colleagues through election to membership in Sigma Xi. Please take a little time to identify individuals who have impressed you with their achievements or the research aptitudes necessary for membership.

Please let us know of any new faculty or graduate students who are Sigma Xi members and who should be on our mailing list. Also, please let us know if your address is incorrect.
